Effect of changes in the dividend interest rate

Figure 1 - Total Annual Income Payments




Figure 1 Illustration shows 55-year-old male, \$500,000 in premium, 10-year deferral, single life with 20-year period certain. Hypothetical Example (prepared February 2021) using NM PDIA illustration. Illustrated dividends are based on the 2021 dividend scale.* Dividends are structured 100% to purchase additional income in 10-year deferral and change to 50% paid in cash and 50% to purchase additional income when annuitized.

In each of these scenarios, a portion of the dividend is used to purchase additional guaranteed income which increases the income payments you receive each year going forward; this new payment will never go down. This locks in future buying power and provides priceless peace of mind that your guaranteed stream of income will continue.
